### Opening the Memory Box

Autobiography, biography, memoirs, family history, life writing: there is no end of interest in these fields at present and one that extends far beyond the famous and their experiences. It was with these thoughts in mind that our in-house writer, Gaye Jee, came up with the idea of helping people to recapture their own memories and turn them into memoirs to share with their families. Her service is called *Memory Box* and I recently had the opportunity to talk to her about it.

She explained to me that, some years ago while studying for a Masters degree in Creative Writing, she engaged in a project writing about her own family's experiences in the East End of London during the first part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. She began with familiar family stories, and then interviewed the older members of her family to flesh these out. She found the more they talked about the significant events in their lives, the more they remembered – the actual act of recalling the past unlocked more stories and more detail. To learn more, I asked her how she envisaged the process unfolding.

"It would be very much a two-way thing - we would schedule a series of sessions to explore the aspects of their lives that they want to recall. I would hope to form a personal bond with my clients and, if possible visit them in their own homes, although we could meet remotely if necessary."


Gaye went on to explain that she would meet up with a prospective client for an initial, free, discussion with a view to scoping and focusing the work on the story the client wants to tell.

How long would it take and what would it cost? Gaye envisages around ten to twelve 90-minute sessions, spaced at least a week apart. Pricing would be agreed in advance, based on the number of sessions.

If the client wanted to turn their memoir into a book, with photographs or other illustrations, Gaye is able to offer that service at an additional cost. However, the client would very much 'direct' the process to ensure they get exactly what they want - material they want to share with their families and friends.

Gaye is currently looking for a "guinea pig" and would be happy to offer her first 'Memory Box' client a substantial discount for the interview process and preparation of a first draft of the manuscript, plus the free initial meeting to discuss content and what they're looking for.

If you've encountered Gaye's work before, one thing you can be certain of is that she will produce a fine piece of writing worthy of the teller.
